

Ravenwood High School Honors Diploma

- ▶ 4 years of science
- ▶ 3 years of the same foreign language sequence (when offered; example ASL, Chinese).
- the student must have a 3.0 GPA or higher,
- a minimum of five Advanced Placement courses
- all honors courses must be taken when offered.

Williamson County Honors Diploma

- ▶ 4 credits of Science
- ► 14 credits must be Honors or AP classes (all middle school math or foreign language credit classes count as Honors.
- ▶ 3.75 GPA

Work Ethic Distinction

Tennessee Diploma with Distinction

Cumulative GPA = B or higher and attain ONE of the following:

- ► Earn a nationally recognized industry certification
- Participate in at least one of the Governor's Schools.
- Be selected as a National Merit Finalist or Semi-Finalist.
- Attain a 31 or higher composite score on the ACT.
- Attain a 3 or higher on at least 2 AP exams.
- ► Earn 12 or more semester hours of transcripted postsecondary credit
- ► Earn statewide recognition or award at a skill or knowledge-based state tournament, convention, or competition hosted by a statewide student organization and/or qualify for national recognition by a national student organization.

Work Ethic Distinction

Students who earn a minimum of 20 points out of a possible 40 points on the industry developed employability standards as well as a regular high school diploma shall be recognized in the graduation program.

Work Ethic Distinction Process:

- 1. Student turns in application packet 100% completed to CTE teacher.
- 2. CTE teacher verifies all pieces are there and accurate.
- 3. CTE Department Chair adds the name to the master list and awards distinction.
- 4. Counselor checks the master list and awards the distinction.

NON-CTE student applications will go to counselors to be processed. The students are responsible for obtaining ALL artifacts from the application packet.

Tennessee Education Lottery Scholarships

Hope Scholarship - (21 ACT/SAT or 3.0 GPA)

- Complete the FAFSA by senior year
- Award Amount Fresh/Soph year \$2,250/semester
- ▶ Junior/Senior year \$2,850/semester

TN Promise - (TN Resident/US citizen/eligible non-citizen, students who graduate from an eligible high school)

- Apply by senior year
- Complete FAFSA by senior year
- Attend mandatory meeting
- Complete and submit 8 hours of community service
