What Are Advanced Placement® Courses?



Advanced Placement *: The Basics

- AP® courses are college-level courses offered in high school
- Courses reflect what is taught in top introductory college courses
- Students will take AP Exams at the end of the course, measuring their mastery of college-level work
- A score of 3 or higher on an AP exam can typically earn students college credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college

AP® at Centennial

- 1,151 AP exams were administered in 2022 to 615 CHS students
- Next year, our AP program will continue to grow with the addition of the AP Capstone Program

AP® Courses at CHS

- Arts: Music Theory, Studio Art, Art History
- English: English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition
- History and Social Sciences: European History, Human Geography, World History, Macroeconomics, Psychology, United States Government and Politics, United States History
- Mathematics and Computer Science: Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Computer Science A, Statistics, Principles of Computer Science
- Sciences: Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Physics I, Physics II
- World languages: Spanish Language, Spanish Literature, French Language
- Non subject specific: AP Capstone (Seminar and Research)





AP Capstone

Two courses: AP Seminar and AP Research

Rather than teaching subject-specific content, these courses develop students' skills in **research**, **analysis**, **evidence-based arguments**, **collaboration**, **writing**, **and presenting**. Students who complete the two-year program can earn one of two different AP Capstone awards, which are valued by colleges across the United States and around the world.

How AP Capstone Works





AP Capstone

AP Seminar is a prerequisite for AP Research (students must score 3 or higher).

Students who score a 3 or higher on AP Seminar and AP Research plus 4 additional AP exams earn an AP Capstone Diploma.





AP Capstone

For the 2023-2024 School Year:

<u>Sophomores</u>: May take AP Seminar in place of English II* (will receive English credit)

Juniors: Must take AP Seminar as an elective

AP[®]: The Benefits

- Students learn rigorous college-level content and skills
- Taking AP is valued in the college admission process
- AP courses are interesting and rewarding academic experiences
- Opportunity to earn valuable credit and placement in college
- Taking an AP course helps students build <u>critical thinking</u>
 <u>skills</u>, <u>confidence</u>, and the essential <u>time management</u> and <u>study skills</u> needed for college success







AP® Helps Students Graduate on Time & Save Money

Students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely to <u>complete a college degree on time</u>. Graduating in four years represents a significant <u>savings on the cost</u> of college.

- Only 1 in 4 college students completes a bachelor's degree in 4 years.
- The average cost of college for a single year is \$21,500** for in-state schools (tuition, fees, room/board, misc. expenses).






AP[®] Expands Students' Options

When students earn college credit through AP Exams, their options and opportunities expand:

- Move to upper-level college courses sooner
- Pursue a double major
- Gain time to study and travel abroad









AP® Exams



AP® Exams

AP Exams are administered by schools worldwide on set dates in May each year.

- Exams are typically 2–3 hours and include:
 - Multiple-choice questions

 Free-response items such as essays, problem solving, document-based questions and oral response

What is it like to take AP®?



AP® Myths & Realities

Myth	Reality
AP courses are for students who always get good grades.	AP courses are for any students who are academically prepared and motivated to take college-level courses.
AP courses are too stressful.	It's no secret that AP courses are challenging. But the support you receive from your classmates and teachers can help you manage the workload.
I don't think I will score high enough on the AP Exam to get college credit.	You don't need to score a 5. Many colleges grant credit — and placement as well — based on a 3 or higher on an AP Exam. Use the website previously described.
Taking AP courses could hurt my GPA.	Taking AP courses shows colleges that you're willing to challenge yourself academically. WCS offers 5 points extra added to the average each quarter.
I can't take AP because no one has recommended me.	If you think you're ready to take an AP course, then you're ready to advocate for yourself — just talk to a teacher or counselor. Start by understanding the courses tonight!





AP Teacher Training & Support at CHS

- In order to teach AP classes, WCS teachers must be certified and highly qualified in the content area in addition to taking the AP College Board certification summer course.
- AP teachers submit their curriculum and syllabus to College Board for approval each year.
- AP teachers, like other CHS teachers, work in curriculum teams supporting learning, evaluating data, and enhancing the learning of all AP students.

- Which courses do you enjoy most in school? In which subjects do you excel?
- What college majors are you considering? What careers excite you?

How many AP courses is too many?

- What activities are you involved in next year?
- How is your time management?
- How do the courses selected match your college and career goals?

Investigate the following questions:

- In which AP courses at our school am I likely to do well?
- Are there other courses that can help me succeed in AP or prepare me for college and careers?

What steps do I need to take?

Utilize the registration process and add courses before May 5th 2023






